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ANOTHER ITALIAN STREET SCENES IN PROGRESSIVE FAIRPORT MURDER CASE

Badly Mutilated Remains Found in Barrel at West Penfield.

TWO BROTHERS ARRESTED

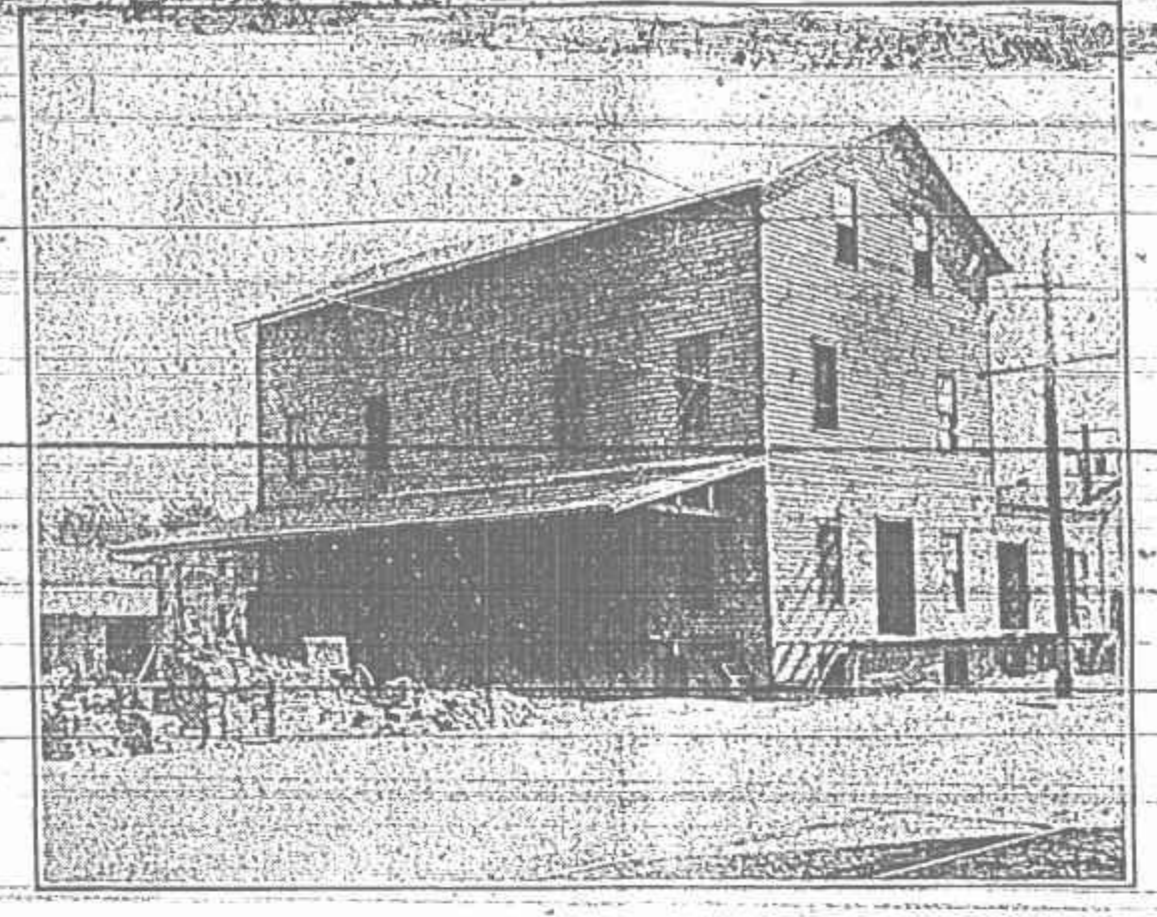
Black Hand Methods Evidently at Bottom of Two Recent Murders in Rochester Italian Colony.

One of the most brutal murders ever committed in this part of the state was brought to light Monday morning, when the brutally mutilated remains of Francesco Manzello, aged thirty-three years, of Brooklyn, were found in an old whisky barrel in a gully about 200 yards from the Rochester & Sodus Bay trolley line power house, on the Webster state road, West Penfield.

The body was headless and dismembered, and had been in the barrel about twelve hours. Smith noticed the barrel when he walked down the path from the road, and after examining the contents, hurried over to A. D. Brown's home, nearby, to tell of the startling discovery. Mr. Brown called up District Attorney Barrett and the county authorities hastened to the scene in automobiles. The remains were taken to the morgue in Rochester, by order of Coroner Kleindienst, who had been summoned by District Attorney Barrett.

The body had been cut up and placed in the barrel, and then taken to the lonely woods and thrown over the embankment to conceal the crime. Manzello was convicted in Rochester, about three years ago of attempted extortion, and that fact leads the authorities to believe that he had been attempting extortion, the crime for which he had previously been convicted, within the past few weeks, to which he plead guilty and was sentenced to serve two and a half years in Auburn prison. He was released six months ago. He went to Brooklyn, and later returned, going to work for Sam Ollis, the banana king. Ollis discharged him not long after, owing to his failure to attend to business. After his discharge by Ollis, he went into business for himself, selling lettuce at the market. He had always been believed to have an intimate connection with the Black Hand organization, and was feared by his fellow countrymen.

Director Whaley had Manzello brought into his office, two weeks ago. He was questioned as to his connections in Rochester, and was asked to leave at his earliest opportunity. Manzello said he was leading a peaceful life and contemplated no operations in Rochester. Director Whaley was satisfied with his story and released him, but warned him to be careful. The theory of revenge is the one that is given most credence by the police, who have worked on the case. They claim Manzello attempted his extortion game once too often and forfeited his life. The scene of the gruesome butchering is not known as yet. Manzello undoubtedly was struck over the forehead with a blackjack and then was dismembered by his assailants. He was surprised, and was not given a chance to fight. The authorities are of the opinion that he was attacked after well laid plans had been made. They claim that a man of his physique would have fought with all his strength if he had had any idea of the intentions of his attackers. Many Italians are under surveillance, and their actions no doubt will have a bearing on the case. The authorities say it is the most gruesome murder ever committed in this county, and they are determined to bring the guilty parties to speedy justice. The scene of the discovery is located about 200 yards east of the Rochester & Sodus Bay trolley line power house on the north side of the Webster state road. There is a deep gully at either side of the road, and dense underbrush makes the bottom invisible from people passing in the road. The likely conclusion is that the barrel, with its gruesome contents, was thrown into the gully with the idea it would not be discovered. The murderers evidently thought the underbrush would cover their crime for many days. The barrel was rolled to one side. The hands, lower part of the trunk and upper ends of the legs were visible first. The unfortunate victim had been decapitated and the head placed at the bottom of the barrel. A bruise on the forehead showed where the victim had been hit on the head, rendering him unconscious before the human butchering took place. The head had been severed from the body by one stroke of a heavy axe or cleaver. The right eye was slightly discolored, and that discoloration and a small bruise on the back of the right hand were the only marks of previous violence on the body. The hands had been crossed and tied

tightly together with the legs, which had been bent back at straight angles with the body. The legs had evidently been cut off with an axe after an effort was made to saw them off. The theory is that the murderers thought the work of dismemberment progressed too slow, using the saw, and finished their gruesome butchering with the axe or cleaver, which they had used in decapitating their victim. The head rested at the bottom of the barrel on a new soft hat. The hat, which was of the Western style, was blood-soaked. The covering of the barrel, a large piece of burlap, had torn loose when the barrel rolled down into the gully, and was found several feet further up the bank. An autopsy was performed at the morgue, in Rochester, Monday afternoon, by Dr. White, coroner's physician for the vicinity in which the barrel was discovered. It was concluded that the victim had been dismembered before life was entirely extinct. The man had made no fight, and evidently had been attacked before he could defend himself. Dr. White, in speaking of the autopsy, said: "The man died from a hemorrhage which followed decapitation. He was most likely rendered unconscious by a blow on the head. A bruise on the forehead, made by a heavy, solid instrument, bears out that theory. Life was not extinct when the dismembering was started by the victim's assailants. Whether he was decapitated first and then brutally butchered, I cannot say. "No poison or 'dope' was used, as the victim's stomach was in good condition. No signs of a struggle were evident. The discoloration under the right eye was caused by concussion of the brain. "A slight bruise on the back of the right hand cannot be accounted for, unless it was caused by falling on some pointed article, following the blow on the head."

Joseph Gablo, aged twenty-eight years, of 240 Monroe avenue, Rochester, and Dominic Gablo, his brother, aged twenty-six years, were held Tuesday night, by District Attorney John W. Barrett on charges of murder in the first degree. Joseph Gablo is a son-in-law of Sam Ollis, the banana king, and the latter is an uncle of Antonio Ollis, the man who was murdered February 27th, last. The murder has never been cleared up by the authorities. Vengeance was sworn by the relatives and Manzello's murder is supposed to have been the outcome.

The Gablo brothers were arrested as important witnesses several hours after the crime was discovered. The testimony taken Monday night and Tuesday morning proved so strong against them that the murder charge was preferred. The deed is supposed to have been committed in Gablo's barn in Railroad street, fronting the public market, Rochester.

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Concrete Floors for Bridges. Frank Lyon, deputy state highway superintendent, is authority for the statement that after this year the state will require all new bridges to be built with concrete floors. The concrete will be far more durable; besides it has been increasingly difficult each year of late to secure planks of any kind for flooring.

CALLS IT DEATH TRAP

Writer Says Town Hall Should be Immediately Supplied With Adequate Fire Escapes.

Mr. Editor:—Amid the busy whirl of business, cares and their strenuous demands on mind and body, it is not surprising that many of our well-meaning and public-spirited citizens are thoughtlessly disregarding the outrageous conditions existing in our local death trap, the Town hall.

It seems almost incredible that a body of intelligent, capable men, such as our town board is supposed to be, should allow the construction and acceptance of this building without the slightest pretense of adequate fire exits of any description.

The recent calamity at Canonsburg, Pa., recalls the attention of the writer and of every thinking man and woman to the urgent needs of the case and the necessity of prompt and efficient action before the name of our fair village is blotted with the record of a similar disaster, due to criminal negligence on the part of a few trusted public officials.

A number of instances have occurred recently when parties interested in entertainments to be presented in the hall, have endeavored to dispose of tickets, the prospective customers have declined to risk the lives of themselves and families in a building in which a fire or panic would cause untold loss of life because of a lack of proper exits.

It is the opinion of the writer that steel fire escapes could easily be constructed upon either side of the building at a moderate cost to the taxpayers, and the unfortunate conditions at present existing be thus greatly improved.

Those who were present during an entertainment given under the auspices of the local lodge of Odd Fellows in the fall of 1909, when a spark set fire to the paper decorations, well remember the near panic which resulted and the difficulty with which the audience was quieted, even when the danger was slight. It is remarkable that serious consequences did not follow the unfortunate occurrence and a second circumstance of like nature might have more distressing results.

It behooves everyone, man or woman, who cares for the welfare of the community and the patrons of the hall, to see that proper action is taken at once, by the town board and adequate facilities be provided to care for the audience in time of fire.

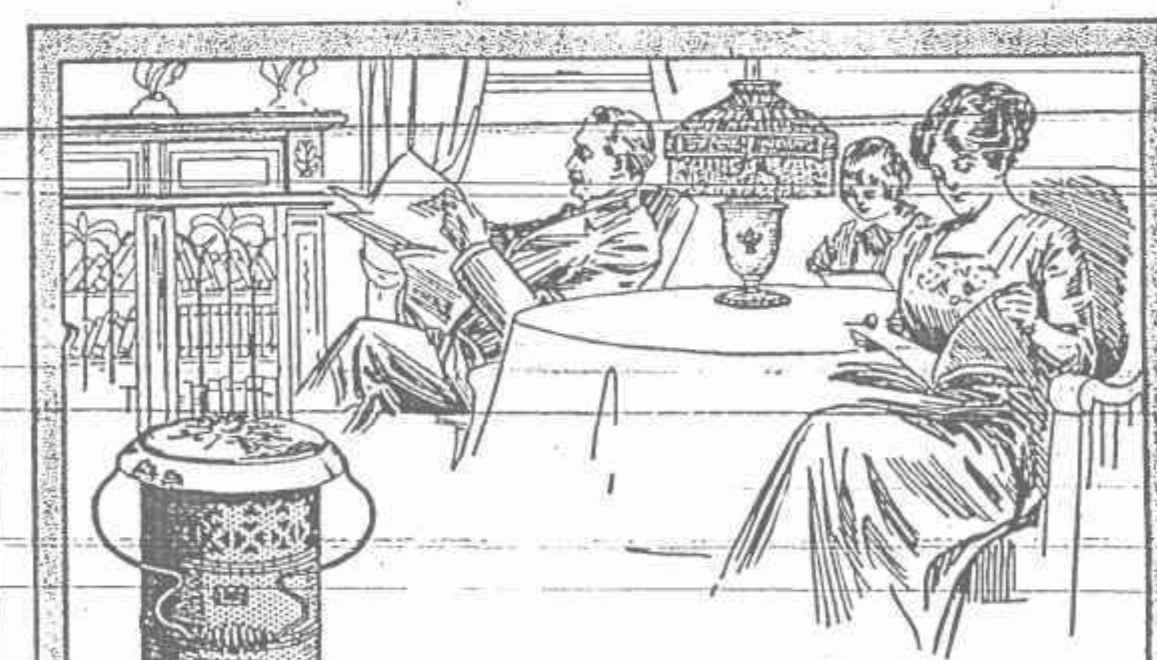
